

Nearly 90 East Quabbin Land Trust supporters gathered together at the New Braintree Town Hall to celebrate the tremendous mission of the organization, share in a fabulous meal prepared by Reed's Catering, of New Braintree and bid on a wide variety of auction items. Craig Della Penna, Executive Director of Northeast Greenways Solutions, treated those gathered to an informative talk about rail trails and how important the Ware River Rail Trail is to the growing network across Massachusetts. All told more than \$6,000 was raised to support the activities of the EQLT. A big round of applause for board members Magi Durham Ziff and Judith Jones for organizing this excellent event. And special thanks to those who donated time or auction items, helped set up and cleanup and of course, thanks to all who attended who made this event such a success.

## Lands Protected: 23 More Acres!

Hardwick, MA—Generous benefactors recently donated 23 acres off the Hardwick common to EQLT for permanent conservation. This parcel expands the corridor of already protected lands, further enhancing the ecological integrity of the east Quabbin. The land is fully forested with a mixture of pine and hardwoods. EQLT anticipates completing a forest stewardship plan in the next year to guide practices. In the future it maybe possible to develop a trail to provide easy public access.

# EQLT Helps Landowners Secure Habitat Funding

In the autumn of 2005 the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries & Wildlife (MAF&W) launched its Landowner Incentive Program (LIP) as a way to assist private landowners throughout the Commonwealth to actively manage their land for wildlife. With the oversight of MAF&W biologists, approved projects work to enhance the landowner's property in a way that directly benefits native wildlife. A particular focus is on restoring and maintaining early successional uplands that support otherwise declining bird populations. One main tool of LIP is to provide cost-share grants to landowners, enabling them to take on large habitat improvement projects that would otherwise prove too costly. The receipt of grant money is dependant upon the landowner agreeing to a ten year Conservation Restriction on their property, along with the submission of a comprehensive management plan that shows a clear strategy to restore/maintain relevant tracts of high quality habitat.

EQLT was pleased to help three separate landowners in Hardwick receive this funding in 2006 by meeting with the landowners, assessing their properties' potential for supporting key species, and ultimately drafting a comprehensive management plan for submission. While having three landowners in Hardwick receive this competitive state funding is exciting, the project's relevance is dramatically increased because these landowners happen to be mutual abutters in the Moose Brook Valley. In all, the properties cover over 500 contiguous acres in this ecologically significant watershed.

Though each landowner is working individually, their goals are very similar, and because their properties are directly linked, their efforts are complementary. Upon completion these projects will provide an open matrix consisting of better than 100 acres each of agricultural grassland for the benefit of Eastern Meadowlark and Bobolink, and low shrub land to support such species as American Woodcock, Blue-winged Warbler, Prairie Warbler, Eastern Towhee and Indigo Bunting. One project even has hopes of reestablishing breeding Whip-poor-Wills to the Valley. And aside from providing critical habitat for these declining birds, the overall ecological integrity of the Moose Brook Valley is greatly enhanced as these projects also work to address invasive species while building sound plant communities.

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# New Braintree Completes Open Space Plan

New Braintree—The Open Space and Recreation plan written by town residents is an inventory of natural and recreational assets of the town and makes non-binding recommendations based on the long term needs of the town. In addition to being a very useful planning document the plan also qualifies the town to receive grants from the Commonwealth's Urban Self-help programs. "The Land Trust formed in 1994 in response to the unnecessary loss of farmland and wildlife habitat to unplanned sprawl."

# Ware River Rail Trail Update: Your Support is Needed

In November, 2005, a sympathetic supporter of the EQLT agreed to provide interim financing for the purchase of the abandoned 3.2 mile Mass Central rail corridor for conversion to a multi-use recreational path. The section purchased by the Central Highlands Conservancy, L.L.C. (CHC) runs from the Hardwick Elementary School to New Braintree and on to Wheelwright along the scenic Ware River and contains four historic bridges. The trail, when developed further, will connect to Gilbertville, Ware and is part of a larger vision of a Boston to Northampton trail corridor along the old Central Mass Rail line. In the near

term, the EQLT has one year to raise \$75,000 to purchase the land from CHC. An additional \$80,000 is needed to revamp bridge decking and railings. In the near future we will be asking for your support to make this tremendous recreational opportunity a reality.

The trail purchase and construction will cost over \$1.1 million dollars. A coalition of public and private funders is essential to fully fund the trail. The federal and state governments have earmarked \$750,000 for the Hardwick-New Braintree-Wheelwright portion of the Ware River Rail Trail. Your support is needed to match those committed dollars.

# East Quabbin Bird Club & Website Launched

Hardwick—Launched in January of this year, the East Quabbin Bird Club has enjoyed early success and hopes to further expand its membership and activities. The mission of the Club is to foster a greater local understanding of the area's ecological resources through the active participation of the community's citizens. The intention is to create a central base where people can come together to learn about the region's ecology, share ideas, and work together to support mutual goals of conservation. Learning and conservation will be pursued through such avenues as monthly birding trips, educational workshops, lectures, club-coordinated bird surveys, the compilation of member's field records, and volunteer workdays on habitat improvement projects. So far we've wandered a moonlight January landscape in pursuit of owls, watched Quabbin eagles establishing territories at Gate 35, and have begun preparing for the upcoming vernal pool season. However, this is just the beginning. Upcoming events include a full day guided exploration of Hardwick's Muddy Brook watershed, an open discussion with nationally renowned bird-conservationist Wayne Petersen, and near weekly bird trips to local destinations to observe returning and breeding birds. 
The East Quabbin Land Trust fills a special niche that only local land trusts can serve.


